Why Collecting Sucks

MADE DAILY

I neither collect nor think highly of people who do. When you look beyond the insipid ego masturbation of having the largest or most unique collection of something, the hobby becomes a dead water eddy on the river of consumerism. The claim of preserving history is a cop-out: creation and destruction make history, not collection. Collectors only make history when they appear in Chuck Shepherd's "News of the Weird" column or when they write books about themselves, like Malcolm Forbes did. If those who fail to study history are doomed to repeat it, those who collect history are doomed to be left out of it.

Let's examine the two types of collecting and the fatal flaws of each:

Collecting usable objects The rarer of the two. Usable object collectors ignore the purpose of the items they collect, thus reducing their impact on society. A good example: the Cabbage Patch Doll. Many collectors bought them and never opened them, expecting the value to increase. Every child who did not receive one, and therefore has no memories of

enjoying the doll, will be less inclined to become an adult collector and purchase one. When the collector removed the doll from its purpose, the doll became nothing but cloth and plastic and will remain so until some little girl or boy buys it at the thrift store.

Collecting useless objects Most collections fall into this category. Often, the object had a purpose, was used for its purpose, and then fell into the hands of a collector who stashed it in a box in the attic. This is all harmless fun but really a waste of space. Once an object has made its impact on history (i.e. is consumed), we may destroy it without fear of losing that impact. Coca-Cola changes their bottle shapes every few years, but the shape of the bottle in 1957 is only important in the effect it had on the shape of the bottle today. Items such as baseball cards stand as the most heinous examples of this category: produced solely for collectors, they provide no useful purpose in society.

Collecting can be a valid hobby: If you collect beer cans and then make furniture out of them, you have participated in the creative/destructive process. Collectors need to make the move to "use" instead of "save" in order to get more out of their hobby than cocktail lounge chatter.

Zine Reviews

XYY John Kelly bills his funny and entertaining magazine as "thrill-packed tales of genetic defectives!" Among the tidbits: an interview with Bud Adams, the 90-year-old owner of S.S. Adams Co., the "world's largest manufacturer of practical jokes and magic tricks since 1906." Among other trivia, Bud recalls how he stopped making itching powder after it sent some people to the hospital and how his father turned down a chance to market whoopee cushions. There's also a recollection by a former member of Jerry Lewis' staff about how moody and cruel Lewis was; a visit to the Billy Graham Museum in Wheaton, Illinois; a clever bit where someone wrote in different dia-



logue for Dave Berg's inane "The Lighter Side of..." strips from Mad; and ten little-known facts about Joseph Stalin. My favorite: Although a bloodthirsty tyrant, the

Russian dictator was only 5-foot-4! There's also a review of the strange autobiography of Chuck ("The Gong Show") Barris, "Confessions of a Dangerous Mind," which was spooky in that the day before I read the review, I had just seen a copy in a used book store and seriously considered buying it. Life is full of regrets (\$3.50 from 82 Kimball Ave., Yonkers, NY 10704).

Slubberdegullion This is the first British zine I've ever reviewed, but Nigel Richardson's essays are well worth the extra postage to request a copy. Nigel lives in Leeds, where I taught at a basketball camp once, so I know how it feels. He has a few zine reviews and letters here, but the soul of Slubberdegullion (defined by one reference as "a nasty, paltry fellow") are Nigel's thoughts on everything from his job as a computer programmer to a girl he knows who used to be a heavy-metal slut. He writes:

These days I come home from work and no longer feel the urge to do something creative to redeem the stolen day. When life seemed really shitty I would sit in front of my computer desperate to write something—anything—that might help make sense of my situation, and I would feel a terrible sense of defeat when I finally fell asleep, as I was being robbed of another day, surrendering another irreclaimable slice of my life. Now it's no big deal.

Wish I could get there, Nigel. He also notes:

I'm surprised never to have seen this in print before—that the worse paid a person is the more expensive it would be to replace them with a machine. Take an office cleaner. How much would it cost to develop a machine that could move around an entire office block, scrubbing, polishing and hoovering all the appropriate surfaces, cleaning desks and putting all the papers and clutter back where it was afterwards, replacing toilet rolls, filling soap dispensers, unblocking urinals, etc., etc. More than £2.5 an hour, or whatever office cleaners get paid. And inversely, most of the guys you find at board level could be replaced by second-hand computers.

The L.A. Gang Bang This zine has been around forever, but I just got a copy. It's a regular update of the activities and adventures of Gary, Lee, Mary and Valorie (they're up to issue 60). They do regular stuff, but it's still fun to read about. Gary, for example, relates how he felt like a nerd talking to this guy at a comic book convention about the Green Hornet, and Mary explains how this brat splashed her three times at the public pool and his mother got mad at her for scolding him. There are also surveys of their friends on topics such as "The Most Useless Thing I've Ever Purchased" or "Your Most Interesting Relative" (\$1 from POB 7550, Burbank, CA 91510).

The Harveyville Fun Times! Even though I sold my Richie Rich comic book collection years ago (see page 3), I still was instantly intrigued by the idea of a zine devoted to Harvey Comics. Besides Richie, there's Little Lulu, Casper the Friendly Ghost, Underdog, Tom & Jerry, Woody Woodpecker, Beetle Bailey, Wendy, the Jetsons, etc. etc. The best article in this issue (Vol 3, No 11) was a detailed examination of the villians Richie has faced, such as the Onion, who used his bad breath to knock you out, and Dr.

N-R-Gee, who had a giant light bulb for a head and could start fires. There was also a special appearance once by Richard Nixon! I enjoyed the introduction to this issue, written by one of the editors, Amy Arnold:

Why do I like Harvey Comics?.... I enjoy entering a sweeter, more fun, and magical world.... Its crooks are bumbling or easily foiled by smart and good hearted people Its moms and dads are nice.... Rich people help the poor. Scientists work for the good of mankind without hurting helpless animals. Witches and ghosts want to make friends.... And the beauty of it is, the worst criminals, witches, ghosts or other magical bad-guys never kill or torture people.

Amy...that was beautiful! (\$2 from 1464 LaPlaya, #105, San Francisco, CA 94122).

dishwasher Pete Jordan, 26, has a mission: Wash dishes in all 50 states. Issue #7 finds Pete at a cafe in Boulder, Colorado, #8 at an Alaskan fish cannery, #9 at a seafood restaurant in New Hampshire, #10 is a special comics issue, and #11 at restaurants in Montana, California and Ohio. Pete has a good attitude about his job, and a sense of humor. "Why is there this assumption that dishwashers are the bottom rung of some sort

of career-climbing ladder?" he asks. Among the articles is a list of the food he ate during one shift: two bagels with cream cheese, bowl of cereal, bowl of fruit, banana, two muffins, straw-

berry pancakes, cheesecake, two sundaes, swiss and tomato sandwich, french fries and five glasses of juice or milk. And things he does for fun on the job: toss lemon slices into the garbage disposal, ignore the waitress that the male customers fawn over, snack on uneaten food, jump and touch the ceiling, float plates on the sink water, use the spray hose to spin metal mixing bowls, play dominoes, read the newspaper in the john. After reading Pete's adventures, I'm more convinced than ever that a clean plate is like a clean soul—you can see yourself (\$1 from POB 4827, Arcata, CA 95521).

Are Traffic Laws Really Necessary? Clarence Shak is a former instructor in mathematics at the University of Hawaii. It's former because now Clarence spends his time lobbying for an end to all traffic laws except reckless driving. For a stamped, self-addressed envelope, he'll gladly send you a copy of his thoughts on the subject. His argument is a bit hard to follow, something about how getting traffic tickets deprives us of our Constitutional right to the pursuit of happiness. He spends a lot of time analyzing the fine print on a ticket he got that had "Notice to Appear" on top of it. Clarence was miffed because the ticket is actually only notice that the officer will file a complaint if you don't pay the fine by the indicated date. So you're being asked to pay off the court not to take action against you! If they'd just synchronize the traffic lights in this part of the country, I'd be happy (POB 15133, Honoluli, HI 96830).

Sparky's Night of Terror! A terrific collection of cartoons by Kit Lively, two of which are reproduced here. They're kind of like the Far Side, but more offbeat and often much more funny. I loved it (\$2 from Rt. 2, Box 146, Celina, TX 75009).

Rediscoveries Mark Harris, who used to own a bookstore in Chicago, wrote me a long letter after he received CC No. 7: "I loved all the stuff on couponing. I've run hot and cold on the use of coupons myself, chiefly because the process seems so time-consuming. My favorite coupons are those restaurant offers for a second entree of equal or lesser value free. What a deal!" I hear you, Mark! The zine Mark does is a list of great but overlooked or forgotten books, as chosen and described by Rediscoveries' readers. I don't read too many

books, so I passed along the nomination forms to my good friend Heather, who eats books for dinner (she has ink running from the corners of her mouth). I'll recommend "The Razor's Edge," though. That was a good one. And I read "Slaughterhouse Five" about five times. I don't think either of those are lost, though (\$1 from 3712 N. Broadway, #190, Chicago, IL 60613).

Tabula Rasa The reference, of course, is to John Locke's theory that everyone is born a blank slate, ready to be formed by his or her individual experiences and environment. Good theory. The first issue of Bill Roussel's zine about childhood memories is a haphazard collection of funny tales about morning breakfast rituals from various of Bill's friends. There's also reviews of modern breakfast cereals and readers' lists of the top five and worst five breakfasts. Yummy (\$1 from POB 6, Ancramdale, NY 12503).

Saprophile If you like Murder Can Be Fun (see CC No. 6), you'll enjoy Saprophile. In his second issue, Eric Landmark takes a look at the making of the A-bomb, how superhighways came about (Hitler invented them!), how brevity can make a joke more funny, and the drastic changes to popular culture that occurred during 1963. It saves you a lot of reading if you're interested in bombs, superhighways, brevity or 1963, and even if you're not, it's still interesting (\$1.50 from 714 E. Johnson, #2, Madison, WI 53703).

Flake A bit pricey at \$5, but it does have a nice color cover. The coolest thing is the reproductions of dozens of old cereal boxes, front and back, but there's also a detailed history of superheroes in cereal box packaging and promotion. The editor, Scott Bruce, will also sell you color laser copies of old boxes if you're nostalgic (cereal not included) (POB 481, Cambridge, MA 02140), \(\mathscr{E} \)

Doug James, a high school and college teacher in Mobile, Alabama, spent 15 years researching his 1991 biography, "Walter Cronkite: His Life & Times" and knows pretty much all there is to know about the former CBS newsman. I interviewed Doug for a small magazine, but they didn't publish the juicy parts.

You spent some time with his mother, Helen Fritsche Cronkite. You're even on her Christmas card list. How did you meet?

I knew Helen was living in Washington, D.C., so I phoned her and she was very receptive. We wrote regularly until her

eyesight got bad, and now we phone. Walter is still her little boy.

Did Walter do anything as a kid that would drive her crazy?

No, she never would say that. You mention in the book that Walter likes striptease acts. Can you elaborate? It's never been a sleaze

thing. He and wife Betsy have a wholesome interest in this form of entertainment. He does a parody striptease at parties, where he takes off his jacket. It's a joke with his friends. It's healthy, I think. I don't know. I've never been to one. It's not that I'm not interested—I don't have the nerve a lot of folks do.

No, I think I look more like John Chancellor.

At one point in the book you write, "If the book reads like a homage to a nearly perfect man, I believe I have not exaggerated." Do you think that's stretching it?

I really don't. When you think about the people who produce the news, how many are there? And who comes to mind as the best?

There are no glaring faults Walter might have to work on?

Not a single one. Isn't that incredible? Have you ever had dreams about him? No.

You mention in the book that Walter had suggested you visit his opthalmologist for an eye problem you had. It sounds like you were close.

You should have seen my eye. At that point, my left eye was blood-red. He has eye troubles too, and had to go to the contacts and things. It looked terrible, so I'm sure it was just him helping a man out.

What did Walter usually have for lunch when he was anchoring?

He had what his assistants called a "Cronkite Special"—a leaf of lettuce with some cottage cheese and a slice of pineapple. And sometimes Metrocal. If there was only one thing you could tell me about Walter that would sum him up, what would it be?

There was a photograph of him in Life where he's on his yacht where he's wearing his sailor's hat and I think a striped shirt. His life has been like a Frank Capra movie.

Besides boating, does he have any other hobbies?

He's really been a daredevil. He's dived in a submarine under the Arctic ice cap; he flew in one of the planes when they were testing for zero gravity, where they do a flip to make you weightless; and he did the hot air ballooning thing in France with Malcolm Forbes but crash-landed. The balloon came down too fast and dragged him across the pasture. He did the sports car racing for a while, and he rolled off a mountain in the Smokies.


Fond Memories of a Fountain That Shot Water in the Air with Brightly Colored Lights and an Inspiring Musical Program

Besides being known for its beautiful beaches, my hometown of Grand Haven, Michigan, is home to the world's largest musical fountain. Every summer night from the fourth grade on, when my family moved across town from Taylor to Lake Street, I could hear the Fountain play its various 15-minute musical programs at precisely 9:45 p.m. each summer night as I tried to fall asleep. Its serenade signaled that I was staying up really late. Then, after the Fountain finished and everyone went home, you could hear the waves lapping again.

Whenever a relative or guest came to town, my parents always insisted we walk down to see the Fountain. My dad usually bribed us with ice cream. I've probably seen the Fountain 50 times in my life, including every Fourth of July. They have a patriotic show before the fireworks, but for us veterans it was like having to sit through the commercials before the movie starts.

The Fountain is actually a bunch of high-powered valves shooting water streams into the air across the channel where they have bleachers where you can sit and watch. But the locals never sat there; if you were a local, you sat in the grass in Bicentennial Park, on a blanket. Each show begins with a little blue flume about 10 feet high and a calming male baritone, "Welcome. I am the voice of the Musical Fountain" while Richard Strauss' theme from "2001: A Space Odyssey" booms in the background. After the intro,

the musical program begins and the water shoots skyward, varying in its color and height with the ebb and flow of the music. That computerage synchonization must have

created quite a stir when the Fountain was completed in 1963 after the community raised the necessary funds and moved about 50,000 yards of sand from the dunes to make room. Unlike the Mackinac Bridge, no one died during construction, and city officials immediately began bragging that it was the largest musical fountain ever made. When I was 17 and an intern at the local paper, I heard a rumor that there was a larger fountain in Germany. But I'd seen how much everyone loved the Fountain and figured it wouldn't be a good idea to pursue the story too vigorously.

A few years ago, I bought "The Official Musical Fountain Souvenir Book" (Pippel-Patterson Co., 1965, 50 cents) at a garage sale for a nickel. It first apologized to readers for its poor attempt to "capture some of the fountain's infinite variety of color and form. Your memory must suffice to capture the enchantment of the musical accompaniment. This is

difficult, we know, for it is like recalling 'Swan Lake' just from seeing colored pictures of the dancers. But it's the best we can offer."

I always did think it was cool how they synchronized the water and colors to change with the music. "During its performance, the Fountain responds so subtly, so delicately, so beautifully to the changes in musical mood and tempo that most observers have but one thought to express their awe: 'Why, it's almost human!" "Yikes! It is also fascinating to read how the fountain works: Enough water for 800 bathtubs (40,000 gallons) is pumped up from the Grand River to the fountain's basin, where it sits 12 inches deep. The water is then pumped through a 16-inch main by 300-horsepower motors at the rate of 4,000 gallons

> per minute (a garden hose delivers about 10 gallons per minute). There are then 8,000 feet of pipe, 300 valves and 1,300 nozzles that send the water 100 feet into the air as the equivalent of 1,000 100watt light bulbs illumi-

nate the flumes with color. The programs are coordinated by computer punch cards that allow some 1,875,352,500,000,000 variations. To cover them all, it would take 20 million years and 4 billion miles of computer tape.

I remember every summer waiting for the night they'd play Beatles songs. One summer they even did a Led Zeppelin program, and I thought I was losing it and had to rush outside to make sure it wasn't just some greaser fixing his car with his stereo blasting. Usually they only play classical and big band music, so it was a real treat to hear music from after 1960. I remember they once played the Beatles' "A Day in the Life," and at the end when there's that pause, all the water dropped back into the basin as the valves shut off. Then BAM! a wall of orange water rose into the air with the crescendo. I thought it was awesome, but I didn't clap or anything. As a local, you had to maintain this bored look about the Fountain, like you were only there



because it was a nice night and you'd been wandering around.

When I was in college, my friend's little brother's summer job was rowing across the river to start the Fountain every night. He always said he'd take me but I guess he forgot. I always wondered how he started it, whether it was a big light switch or something. He had to sit there until the show was over and then row back. That was his whole summer job. I once did see the bowels of the Fountain in elementary school during a field trip, but it was during the day and just looked like a big heating coil. It must have been in the winter, because there was no water in the basin.

The Musical Fountain was a huge part of my growing up, but it's still odd to look back and realize how much I miss it. When you heard the Fountain kick in on Memorial Day, you knew the long summer days would soon arrive! The Fountain helped me mark time; its music was always there, like a lullaby. Someday I'd like to row across the Grand and stand in the Fountain's basin as it begins its musical program, my arms spread wide as I bath in its colorful baptismal. But I've moved too far away to even hear the Fountain anymore or the lap lap lap of the waves. I remember dancing with my first girlfriend on the picnic tables at the beach, and the cool lake breeze on the back of my neck, and the Fountain music sneaking along the lakeshore, and I kissed her. I was happy. A

Hacks on Film

As a journalist, I've seen my share of films that portray reporters as loath-some, bumbling, foul-mouthed, dim-witted social misfits concerned only with twisting the truth into scandal.
